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Featured Program –

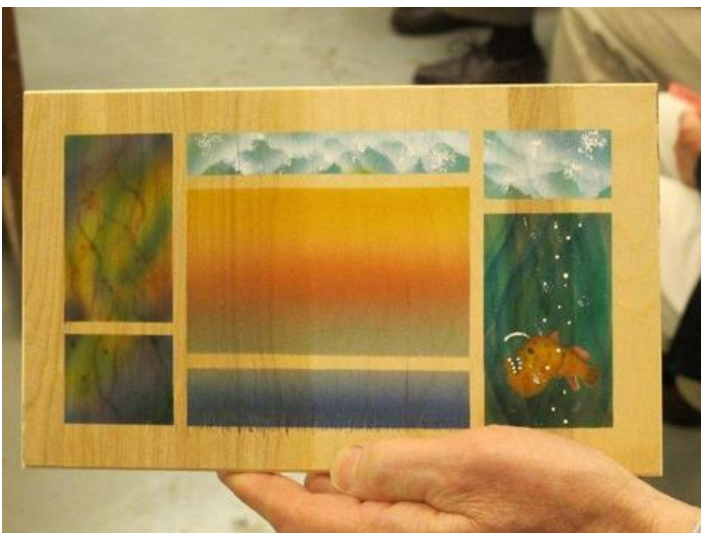
The program this month was a piercing and airbrushing demonstration by Mike Kehs, who lives locally in Bucks County, PA. Mike provided a little background on himself, having worked as a stone mason for many years before moving full time into the creative wood work he now does. Starting out his demo, Mike acknowledged his debt to Binh Pho for sharing his knowledge and inspiration with Mike in the past.



Mike recommends using material with a wall thickness of 1/16" – 1/8" for the piercing work with the NSK air powered tool he prefers, using an end mill type bit. Mike generously supplied a 2 page list of equipment sources for those of us interested in acquiring this capability. He demonstrated the process of masking off individual areas of the work surface and use of "frisket" material to protect the more intricate shapes during the painting process, and described how he achieves the "hidden shapes" like starfish in the pierced field by drawing them in first.



Mike then demonstrated the IWATA air brush and painting process, using water-based paint from Golden to achieve an amazing variety of special affects like crashing waves, under water scenes, sunsets, etc. as seen below.
